

Walking Tour of Philosophical Athens

Join fellow philosophers for an evening walk through the intellectual heart of Athens - a reflective, embodied tribute to Aristotle and the philosophical tradition.

Itinerary

- Start: 17:30 from the Conference Venue 9 Chalkokondili Street, 10677 Athens
- Walk down Panepistimiou Street toward Syntagma Square, with short stops outside the Athenian Trilogy: the National Library, the University of Athens, and the Academy of Athens-where the statue of Plato is located.
- Enter the metro station from the entrance near Hotel Grande Bretagne. Walk through the underground corridor observing archaeological displays in the metro. The station features remnants of ancient city walls, a section of the Peisistratian Aqueduct, and a cemetery from the sub-Mycenaean to Byzantine periods. Also on display are parts of a Roman bath, an ancient road, various pottery items, a 4th-century BC skeleton, and a mosaic floor fragment from an ancient house.
- Exit through the Parliament/Upper Syntagma exit, facing the Hellenic Parliament.
- Pause at the statues of the three Greek tragedians (Sophocles, Aeschylus, and Euripides) outside the National Garden.
- Walk to the Kallimarmaro Stadium (Panathenaic Stadium), the site of the first modern Olympic Games in 1896
- Walk to Aristotle's Lyceum

Special Feature

At the Lyceum, philosophers contributing to the conference will have the opportunity to share a few reflective words on Aristotle and his enduring legacy.
